Children Singing for Children Concerts 10th , 11th & 12th Nov. 2009, St Mary's Church, Banbury



Over 430 children from 20 local primary schools, supported by the winners from the Banbury Young and Junior Musicians of the Year 2009, took part in this year's hugely popular Children Singing for Children concerts.

The highlight of each evening's concert was the massed choir finale, where up to 160 children were on stage to sing, World in Union, Hey Mr Miller and Senwa Dedende, leading to calls of 'Encore!' from the large & enthusiastic audiences.

The two main recipients will receive £2000.00 each.

SPEAKER REPORTS.

The Rise and Fall of Menvier

Rotarian Charles Swain, the ex chairman of Menvier gave us a fascinating account of how Menvier started in 1975 and charted its rise to becoming a company of international importance operating in 9 countries, employing 2,400 people and having a turnover of some £115 million.

Pre 1975 Charles was running an electrical contracting company in Banbury with some people permanently occupied in keeping the electric's at General Foods operating smoothly, President Roger Worrall being one of those people]. Due to legislation there was a need for battery operated emergency lighting systems in all public buildings, but architects and designers did not like the ugly systems that were available at the time.

Charles saw the potential for fitting an emergency system within the envelope of existing fluorescent lighting fittings, which nobody had been able to achieve before.

He started a new company which was called Menvier, brought Roger back in house to run production and employed more electrical engineers to work on the difficult problems of getting emergency fittings to stand to the heat generated inside the fluorescent fitting and also give a good battery life.

The new product proved to be a success and the fledgling company was given a huge boost by the miners strikes at the time, causing random power cuts which could leave offices and factories, without emergency lighting systems, in darkness.

A new factory was built to cope with the demand with Roger in charge of the production of emergency lighting systems, fire alarm panels, controllable micro processors and printed circuit boards. Two of the notable successes at this time were the supply of ELS systems for the new Birmingham Airport and for the Hong Kong Railways.

Rapid growth built on demand continued, supplier and allied companies were taken over and a factory built in Australia.

In 1985 Menvier was floated on the Unlisted Securities market and in 1987 the old, Townley Stone Co. building was acquired to increase the manufacturing capacity in Banbury.

In 1992 Menvier achieved a full listing on the Stock Market and in 1993 intruder alarms were added to their basket of goods on offer.

By this time Menvier controlled 18 companies including factories in Australia, Holland, Sweden,

Germany, Portugal, France (Luminox) and Ireland. The French Government actually gave them a factory and the Irish Government gave them a 50% grant to start up in Kilarney with a plastic injection moulding company.

In 1993 Charles retired as Chairman and sold his shares in 1996, control of the company fell into the hands of US based Cooper Inc The American giant, Cooper Industries asset stripped it so within two years of Charles retiring Menvier was no more.

My Job Talk by Andrew McHugh Friday 30th Oct 09

Andrew McHugh has had a varied and interesting career as a soldier working for the Queen, in business working with the Sultan of Oman, and with the Aga Khan's Health Service in Tajikistan.

He trained initially at Sandhurst and subsequently worked with the Royal Artillery serving in Belize. He transferred to the Army Pay Corps and was Paymaster to the Scots Guards. While attached to the Pay Corps he developed an interest in amateur dramatics.

He subsequently worked with the Sultan of Oman as Staff Paymaster encountering considerable corruption which he was asked to eradicate. This was achieved by introducing a transactional computer system in order to identify each individual soldier thereby preventing fictitious payments to the wrong people.

In 1996 he developed an interest in the design of beds for the morbidly obese and became a Director of the company making beds for people who were fifty stone in weight.

In 2000 he went to Tajikistan working with the Aga Khan Health Service as Chief Finance Controller. He showed us beautiful pictures of the countryside including the high Pamirs and the extremely poor quality of the hospitals which had no water and no oxygen. He was involved in their renovation and again encountered considerable corruption. There was no heating even though the temperature went to -27 on occasions.

His wife obtained a job in St Helena in the South Atlantic and he accompanied her. During this period he did a correspondence course and graduated with a Masters Degree in Health Services Management from the London School of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene. He is currently the Manager at the Horse Fair General Practice in Banbury and recently oversaw their move from North Bar to South Bar.

Classic Car Rallying.

Our speaker on Friday 6th November was David Rings, who incidentally, was a founding member of the Rotary Club of Brackley. Never one to be too serious, his talk was both informative and very amusing.

Having realised an ambition to own a classic sports car, he soon tired of, as he put it, "just driving it" and decided to get involved in Classic Rallying. Obviously not being one to do things by half measures, the first rally he entered was the Monte- Carlo Retro, where he surprised himself and the other competitors by finishing in the top 30 out of around 90 entries.

He has since taken part in 2 more Monte-Carlo and numerous other rallies in the UK, the continent and one in North Africa, in either his Austin Healey 3000 or Porsche 356.

Professional rallying by modern works teams takes place on closed roads or tracks and is an out and out speed event, where the fastest car is the winner. Historic Classic rallies take place on public roads, the aim being to drive at a given average speed between check points. Points are deducted for arriving too early or too late. If, due to hold ups or through taking the wrong route, you have to make up time, that's when the fun begins!

As with the professional teams, the navigator is as important as the driver; David's navigator is his daughter. Teams are usually only given their route details shortly before their start time and in that period have to consult the maps, plan the route and their strategy for the rally. Route plans can vary from detailed notes combined with distances and illustrations of road junctions, to just a series of grid references.

David's talk covered several aspects of rallying and after fielding a variety of questions from the members, he was given a warm round of applause for an entertaining insight into his hobby.
